INTERESTING SERVICES.

Dedication of the New Baptist Church in Bradley.

A pleasant time to the people of Bradley, in which Bangor people had a part, and for which they receive the thanks of many grateful hearts, was the dedication of the Baptist church in Bradley, on Thursday, March 30th, at 2 o'clock P. M. The Building Committee, who have had the care of this work, was chosen late in September, and on the 13th of October let the carpenter work to Mr. Foster, of Bradley. At this time there was pledged in all \$1,050, viz: \$359 by Bradley and Oldtown; \$200 by the two Baptist churches in Bangor and \$500 by Dr. Rieker, Secretary of the State Convention. Since that time this amount has all been collected and about \$600 more. The house has cost \$1,860.89. At the time of dedication \$154.53 was raised so that the house was dedicated with very debt provided for. Money has been secured as follows, through the labors of J. Rieker: \$530: from the Bangor churches \$200, to which should be added \$25 at dedication; from Oldtown Church and Society \$93, to which should be added \$20 at dedication. The balance of the cost has been chiefly covered by the people of Bradley.
